




DECEMBER 2022

The highlight of the day was meeting a robotic dog worth £35,000 and watching it walk around the event all afternoon.


Students came away from the event with a greater understanding of the wide range of jobs available in Engineering and seeing first hand the new and emerging technologies which are constantly developing the world.

Year 8

Since the last newsletter was shared, we completed Year 7 and have moved into Year 8. For the first time in what seems like a long time, it was a 'normal' start to the year in the sense we were not returning from a lock down or having to operate in bubbles. It was a huge relief and it meant that we could get straight down to business.

The end of Year 7 was rounded off with a final assembly. This was an opportunity to reward and recognise the success of the students who had achieved some excellent results in the Challenge Walk and 'Zone Day'. The assembly was also the first time we were able to present the 'Form of the Year' trophy.

Huge congratulations must go to Mr Douglas' form class who were the first winners of the award. The trophy is presented to the form class who have accumulated the highest number of points across several categories: fewest number of detentions; fewest referrals to the Behaviour Centre; most students with zero sanctions over the year and the form class with the highest attendance percentage. Runners up this year were 8KHo and 8JPa. There was only a small difference in points across all seven form classes and it really does highlight how the contribution of every student can have an impact!

As part of that final Year 7 assembly, we also presented a number of awards and certificates for a range of awards. This all culminated in the presentation of our first 'Students of the Year' awards. It was a huge privilege to present Sophie (JPa); Francesca (CEn); Maisy (JWe); Logan (DGr); Riley (KHo); Jed (JDo) and Maisie (SMa) with their certificates. I know form tutors found the nomination process difficult as each form had several students who could have won the award but this just highlights how many students in the year group are displaying the attributes that we are all striving for.

These attributes were demonstrated admirably back in September when we received an email from a lady who had been caught up in a hit and run car accident. She was left in a very distressed state and, sadly, no one stopped to help. However, the situation was rescued by two Year 8 boys – Daniel and Jacob who had seen the incident and managed to get some images of the offending vehicle; they then stayed with the lady until her husband arrived and were then able to share their images in the hope that the other vehicle could be traced.

Back in school, we moved toward the half term and students were challenged to submit a Halloween story for our annual writing completion. The overall standards were very high across the school and a number of students were highly placed for their competition entries. It was therefore fantastic to see that the overall winner was another Year 8 student – Daniel.

This spirit of completion and participation is reflected in the weekly totals of students who are submitting reviews as part of their on-going AIR work as Year students are regularly submitting the most numbers of reviews.



As I complete these few comments, the students of 8CEn are preparing for a 'Bake Sale' that they have planned in order to raise funds for the PDSA. There are some amazing-looking bakes arriving and preparations are well underway for the break time sale. We wish them well and hope it is a great success!


Year 9

FOODBANK FRIDAYS




A volunteer from the food bank came to visit the pupils in Year 7 during their assembly; to ask for volunteers to help The Bay foodbank.

As lead school for Leadership, Coaching and Volunteering we are working closely with Whitburn School in Sunderland, creating a Leadership structure to create a greater extra-curricular workforce using Year 10-13 students. We also have a fund to support RISE (our local Active Partnership) to create a Youth Board.

We have also developed the leadership skills of our Year 10 Sports Studies pupils as part of the coursework requirements of their course. All pupils delivered either a football, rugby, basketball, badminton or netball session to Year 7 pupils. All pupils did a great job and this will go towards their coursework grades.





GIRSL FOOTBALL IN SCHOOLS #LETGIRLSPLAY



John Spence has always been proud to support the opportunities for girls to play Football, either in lessons or during extra-curricular clubs and competitive opportunities against other schools, not forgetting the well-attended Girls Football Academy on Thursday mornings.

With local talent coming out of John Spence and into the professional and semi-professional game such as Shelley Brogden, Jessica Brown and Georgina Spraggon it is fantastic to have local role models for the young girls in our area.

For the past four years we have been heavily

involved within the Youth Sport Trust mission to support the FA Inspiring Change strategy to allow equal access to Football by 2024. We are seen as a beacon school nationally in supporting this and are regular used for case studies and discussions about exemplar practice. It was no surprise then that we received a called from BBC journalist Helen Richardson!

On the 17th of November the BBC cameras had all eyes on John Spence Girls Football Academy!

The Girls Football Academy featured on both BBC Politics North* and BBC Breakfast highlighting the importance of Girls' Football within the PE curriculum in schools, capitalising on the success of the England Women's football team European Championship win in the summer.

The girl's academy session was filmed and featured heavily throughout the news snippet.

The girls represented excellently in what was baltic weather on the day! Both Ella (Year 7) and Ruby (Year 9) were interviewed by Political Reporter Helen Richardson and talked about the importance of Girls Football within the curriculum, highlighting the opportunities that they have at John Spence when it comes to girls football as well as it helping with their ambitions in football as they grow up.

Ruby is an excellent ambassador for Girls Football and is currently in post as the Barclays Game Changer for North Tyneside. She regularly works with other Game Changers from the North East to think of ways to create more

opportunities for girls to play. As part of the work, Ruby has been into local primary schools, attended NUFC Women games (received a free season ticket) and also created FIFA cards from her skills as a player and ambassador. Ruby coaches at the local Wildcats sessions (Girls Football for Primary aged) which are open to all young girls in the area and held at John Spence 4pm -5pm in partnership with North Shields Juniors. Ruby is a real asset to the school and local area.

It is fanatic to see Girls Football on the rise and we are so proud to be riding the wave with it. The Lionesses certainly have made an impact on the sport, as have the NUFC Women's team. The St James Park experiences they have recently had have been excellent family days out at a low cost. Check out their website for their next fixture!

The term has been super busy for everyone involved in PE and School Sport at John Spence. We finally feel like we are back up and running at full speed after the past couple of years.


Clubs have been well attended, academies thriving and festivals/competitions/fixtures taking place multiple times a week involving boys and girls from all year groups.



NOUGHTS AND CROSSES

NOUGHIS CROSSES

Sephy and Callum sit together on a beach. They are in love. It is forbidden.

Sephy is a Cross and Callum is a Nought. Between Noughts and Crosses there are racial and social divides. A segregated society teeters on a volatile knife edge.

As violence breaks out, Sephy and Callum draw closer, but this is a romance that will lead them into terrible danger.



On the 19th October, the drama department took 30 of their students to the Northern Stage to watch the award winning performance of 'Noughts and Crosses.' Pilot Theatre is committed to presenting younger audiences with big ideas relevant to their lives right now. For our students, it may well be their first encounter with this form. Getting it right is a big ask, and there's no bigger issue for young people today than systemic racism. Malorie Blackman's Noughts and Crosses is as relevant today as it was when it was written over 20 years ago. Yearning for a world where we're free to love whoever we choose, is a tale as old as time – think Romeo and Juliet, West Side Story – but this tale of forbidden love is set in the context of racial segregation, capital punishment and

systemic oppression of a single community...in an altered reality that could be any time, any place and yet is every time and every place. This award-winning theatre adaptation by Sabrina Mahfouz is uncomfortable, challenging the audience to face up to their own discrimination and prejudice, just as Sephy and Callum have to. Inspired by infrared photography, Simon Kenny's 'familiar but different' set design is versatile, simple and suggestive, the costume design is subtle and yet indicative of the clear differences between the two groups in this society. Using screens to show on TV what is happening on the stage works well, making the connection that what we see on TV is happening in real life

somewhere, to real people. The action on stage is enough to hold the attention of every audience member. You forget who's around you, just like you should. You're invested in these two young people before you, full of dreams and potential, kindness and love – and yet seemingly powerless to make change happen. We all have something to learn here. Ending on a note of hope, there is still much to be done for all those of any age who, like Sephy and Callum, believe that a better world is possible.

A MIDSUMMER NIGHT'S DREAM



On the 2nd November, the drama department took 30 of its Key stage 4 students to watch the chaotic, calamitous and comedic 'A Midsummer Night's Dream' at the Northern Stage.

This was Shakespeare as you've not seen him before, in the round and very much brought to life with relevance, grit and a large dose of

Northern attitude. The different strands of Shakespeare's best loved comedy entwine, as do the modern cultural references with traditional text. It lifted the script off the page and into your lap, enticing you to become part of the show at times.

It tells the story of Hermia who is given an ultimatum to marry Demetrius, live forever alone or die. She escapes with her true love Lysander to the woods, followed by Helena and Demetrius. Mischievous fairy, Puck, wreaks havoc, things don't go to plan to comical effect and Bottom undergoes a hilarious transformation. Interspersed with this, the entertaining yet inept Mechanicals are rehearsing for a play. Their rehearsals build up throughout the play to a final showpiece, providing light to the sometimes darkness of the woods.

The mix of accents was refreshing: Liverpudlian, Glaswegian, Geordie, as is the fact that one of the main characters, Lysander played by William Grint, was a Deaf actor. The integration of sign language into the performance is ground breaking, it really works with the characters and performances. A hilarious performance enjoyed by all!

KS3 PANTOMIME




On Thursday 8th December 36 students look forward to watching the *Cinderella* pantomime at Newcastle Theatre Royal (oh yes we are!).

All responses are acknowledged. That's our promise. So every submission that is sent in, long or short, will be read and a response will be sent back to your child. We'll encourage, we'll praise and we'll offer advice to improve. The idea is that the next one will show progression, and the one after that, and....

We provide articles, short stories, sports journalism; we recommend texts and suggest interesting alternatives based on preferences shared by your children. We love it when they choose their own, when they find and enjoy their own texts. It reminds us of when we were young, discovering Roald Dahl, JRR Tolkien, Jacqueline Wilson and George RR Martin for the first time. We love to read and we'd love your child to love to read too.

So please help us by encouraging your children to participate. 2500 in nine weeks is still fewer than 300 on average a week and that's about where we are. Imagine if we could hit 500 a week? What a dream it would be to top 700? Then, well, we can only shiver at the thought of a full house (or near enough) of over 850 returns in a single week. What a collective effort that would be: parents, carers, relative, school staff and, most significantly, the students themselves.
